Viewing the latest news through the lens of Scripture

Iranian pastor Behnam Irani was arrested in 2010 for “action against the state” for refusing to stop leading a Bible study. In 2014, more charges were brought against him, including “spreading corruption on Earth,” which carries the death penalty with it. He was kept in prison for more than six years, sometimes being interrogated for hours or tortured. Eventually the charges against him were reduced, and he was set free a few years ago.

Evangelical Christians make up a small minority in the largely Shia-Muslim country of Iran, but some reports say their numbers are growing at an incredible rate of 20 percent a year, which would make it one of the fastest growing church families in the world. Back in 1979, when the Iranian revolution established a hard-line Islamic regime, many thought the Christian church in Iran was destined to die. Bibles were banned, Christian ministers were killed, and evangelism was made illegal. Persecution of Christians became an everyday reality.

But instead of dying or fading, the church in Iran is going strong. The violence has caused Iranians to question the religion of Islam and has caused Christians to speak out, instead of shutting up. As a result, as Mark Howard of the Gospel Coalition observed, “more Iranians have become Christians in the last 20 years than in the previous 13 centuries put together” (<https://www.thegospelcoalition.org/article/the-story-of-the-irans-church-in-two-sentences>). A new film also highlighted the growth of the Iranian church, and Dalton Thomas, the director of the film, called the growth of the Christian movement in Iran the “Iranian awakening.” He noted that the movement in Iran “owns no property, no buildings, no central leadership, and is predominantly led by women” (see more at <https://foxnews.com/faith-values/worlds-fastest-growing-church-women-documentary-film>).

As students arrive, give each of them a copy of the above news story to read. After all teens have had the opportunity to read the article, discuss it in this way:

Imagine you were faced with imprisonment and torture for continuing to practice your faith. What would you do? Why?

There are all kinds of suffering in the world, and it’s often hard to see the reasons for it. What do you think about suffering that comes from persecution? How would you explain the reasons for that kind of suffering?

What do you think? Does the principle of freedom of religion help or hurt a country? Explain.

People today suffer for different reasons. Today we’ll read in Acts that the apostles suffered for their faith in Jesus, but they were able to use their persecution for His glory.
