# Lesson 12 **Memory Verse:**

Blessed are those who keep his statutes and seek him with all their heart.

-Psalm 119:2

In order to get them thinking about what can happen when we don't ask for help, students will watch a funny video clip about young child making a big mess.

### **Materials:**

- Internet access
  - > Tell about a time when you did something without asking your parents and regretted it later. (Students may talk about participating in an event, cooking a recipe or doing a project at home, eating food that was meant to be saved, staying up all night, etc.)

Sometimes we just can't see the whole picture of how something will turn out. But asking someone older and wiser before you take action can save you from getting into a big mess. Let's watch a video of a toddler who didn't ask for help before getting some cereal—and made quite a mess!

Imagine how much less messy this situation would have been if the toddler was old enough to ask for help getting some cereal! The child in the video tried to get their own snack and made a big mess that their parents had to clean up. But there are more ways for things to go wrong than just by making a big mess.

While you're all old enough to know not to make a big mess in your house, you still have to make decisions at home and school where it may be wise to ask someone for help.

> What are some situations in your life where asking an adult for help would be a good idea? (Answers will vary. Students may talk about situations with schoolwork, friends, and extracurricular activities. If possible, tell a story from your own childhood where you forgot to ask for help and got into trouble.)

Sometimes we don't want to ask for help because of our pride—we think we can handle it on our own. Other times we may just forget to ask for help. One time, Joshua, a leader of Israel, forgot to ask God for help when he had an important decision to make. Let's find out what happened.

# Lesson 12 **Memory Verse:**

## **Materials:**

- Paper
- Pens/pencils
- Whiteboard and marker (or screenshared document)
- Optional: Internet access, envelopes

If your class is meeting online, invite students to bring supplies with them to class.

While your students are working on their Step 3 activities, write the following on your whiteboard (or screenshared document):

- God, I need Your wisdom with a friendship.
- God, I need Your help with a difficult family situation.
- God, I need Your help with which activities I should spend time on.
- God, I need Your help with the negative way I think about myself.

Joshua got into trouble because he trusted his own judgment and forgot to ask God for help. God always knows what we should do, and He is always available to us. We can come to Him in prayer to seek wisdom on big and small decisions.

Ask a volunteer to read today's memory verse (Psalm 119:2). This verse tells us we will be happiest when we obey what God tells us to do in Scripture such as caring about other people and putting Him first. Seeking Him with all our heart means remembering to ask Him for help. God is loving and powerful. He wants us to come to Him instead of trying to do things our own way.

Distribute supplies (or invite students to have them ready at home). Tell students they will be writing a prayer letter to God, asking Him for help in an area of their lives. They may write about help they need in any area but point out the prompts you wrote on the whiteboard if they get stuck.

God is so wise and powerful! We can talk to Him about anything and He promises to hear us and answer.

Give students a few moments to work on their letters and sign their names; if you opted to provide envelopes, hand those out at this time. Put this prayer letter to God in your Bible and pray it every day this week. Remember that as new situations arise, you can always write a new letter. And don't forget to write down how God answers you. When things are going wrong in our lives, God is always ready to help.

Close in prayer.
