Lesson 7**Memory Verse:**

Your students will discuss ways young people can be generous—even without money.

Materials:

- Internet access

The last several years have created a lot of financial anxiety and uncertainty—for families, communities, and our country as a whole. Many of us may have felt that financial stress in our communities or known a friend or relative who had to find a new job. Even though we can't always help others financially, there are many ways to show kindness and generosity that don't cost money. Let's take a look at some ideas.

Share the following list under the “Let's chat about acts of kindness” heading with your students. As they read through the list, encourage them to take notes on ideas that resonate with them.

- **This list isn't just for kids—it's a good reminder for everyone. What are three ideas that are particularly suited to someone your age?** (Answers will vary.)
- **What are some stories you've heard in the past month that illustrated generosity?** (Be ready to share not only national or global stories but also local philanthropy.)
- **A believer in Jesus has different motivation for helping others. It's not just about “the human spirit” or feeling good about ourselves. What is the difference?** (Christians are not only commanded to give generously, but they are reflecting the grace and character of their Savior.)

➤ **Most people will give something if there's a promise of reward or recognition. For example, someone might try to sell the most tickets to a charity event in order to earn first place in a contest. Why should we give even if there's no payback?** (The quiet, anonymous giver is best positioned to throw the glory back to God rather than take it for himself.)

Giving generously is an unnatural act in a selfish, pleasure-seeking world. It's important to study God's perspective on money and possessions instead of following the crowd.

Materials:

- Paper
- Pens or pencils

If your class is meeting online, invite them to bring supplies with them to class.

Did you know that you don't need a lot of money to bless someone? You have everything you need to be a generous giver, even without the help of your mom or dad. The early church shared what they had with other believers, and you can model that same spirit of love today.

Distribute supplies (or invites students to have them ready at home). Encourage students to think of three family members, neighbors, organizations, or ministries that could be blessed by their talents or treasures. Invite students to write those three names or organizations onto their papers.

Next, help students identify some skills they have, perhaps using the article from Step 1 for inspiration. Encourage them to write down any ideas that come to mind for how to bless those people or organizations as you guide them through the following discussion.

- **Which items on your list would be excellent to do with another family member's help?** (Accept all reasonable responses.)
- **Are there some items that can be repeated on a more consistent basis? How can we get into a habit of cheerful giving?** (One-and-done acts of kindness are great, but it's even better to build a natural habit of giving through repetition.)
- **Can any of your ideas be "secret" blessings? Why is it sometimes good to *not* be recognized for our deeds?** (It is better to let God have the glory for an act of kindness instead of posting it in a self-seeking online post or signaling in any way that you want people to "look-at-me.")
- **Moms and dads are great resources, but can you do something on your list without their help?** (Let students share their ideas.)

As you close, remind your students that even though they are still young, they can follow Jesus' commands to give generously. Their three ideas are ready to go! Encourage them to follow through this week.

Pray to close.
